


# The Summer of the Beautiful White Horse



William Saroyan (August 31, 1908 – May 18, 1981) was an Armenian-American novelist, playwright, and short story writer. He was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1940, and in 1943 won the Academy Award for Best Story for the film adaptation of his novel The Human Comedy.

## CHARACTERS

### 1. Aram

Aram is the narrator of the short story. He is a nine-year-old Armenian boy and a member of the Garoghlanian family, who live in the San Joaquin Valley in California. The Garoghlanians

are poor and he has dreamed of riding a horse his entire life.

## 2. Mourad

Mourad is Aram's thirteen-year-old cousin. His family believes that he is "crazy". Mourad "borrows" the horse from John Byro by himself and keeps it hidden in a barn for over a month.

## 3. Uncle Khosrove

Khosrove is Aram and Mourad's "crazy" uncle. It is believed that Mourad has inherited the "crazy streak" from his uncle Khosrove. He is a tall man who is always angry and impatient.

## 4. John Byro

John Byro is an Assyrian farmer and a friend of the Garoghlanian family. Byro is the owner of the white horse.

# PLOT SUMMARY IN POINTS

The Summer of the Beautiful White Horse is narrated by a nine-year-old Armenian boy named Aram, a member of the Garoghlanian tribe, living among the lush fruit orchards and vineyards of the San Joaquin valley in California.

One morning Aram is awakened at four in morning by his thirteen-year-old cousin Mourad, who everyone thinks is crazy.

Aram is astonished to see that Mourad is sitting on a beautiful white horse.

He cannot understand where Mourad got this beautiful horse when they do not have enough money to afford one.

In spite of being poor, the Garoghlanian tribe is noted for its honesty and trust. It is unthinkable that Mourad would have stolen the horse.

Mourad is a crazy child. Mourad's crazy behavior was considered to be of natural descent from their uncle Khosrov. Uncle Khosrove was an enormous man who was always furious and impatient.

Aram was invited to ride on the horse with Mourad. They enjoyed rides on the horse for a few hours. Mourad is determined to keep it, and they try their best to keep the horse a secret from others. They hid it from the rest of the world by keeping it in a barn of the deserted vineyard.

Aram came to know that the horse was stolen from John Byro. That afternoon John Byro came to Aram's house. He reported to Aram's mother that his white horse which had been stolen a month ago was still missing. Again uncle Khosrove became annoyed, he said, "It's no harm, don't cry over a horse."

Two weeks later, when they were going to take the horse back to its hiding place, they met Byro on the road. The farmer was extremely surprised. He recognized his horse but refused to believe that the boys had stolen it.

Later the boys return the horse. That afternoon John Byro came to Aram's

house to inform them that the stolen horse had been returned.

**Ans.** Aram was keen to ride the white horse alone. He leaped to the horse-back and even kicked into its muscles. It snorted and began to run. It went out of control. It leaped over seven vines. Aram fell but the horse continued running.

Q5. What change did John Byro notice in his horse after it was returned to him?

**Ans.** John Byro was not only happy but also surprised when he got his missing horse back. He failed to understand how his horse had become stronger and better tempered than before. He thanked God for the change.

**Ans.** Mourad, the son of Zorab, was the 13-year old cousin of Aram. He was considered as crazy as his uncle Khosrove. He was not as honest as his family or tribe. He did not hesitate to steal John Byro's horse. He was as fond of horse riding as his cousin. But he did not have the means to buy a horse. Very cleverly he hid the horse in a deserted barn and took it out at daybreak for a joy-ride. He loved adventure and singing. He had remarkable self-confidence. He said boastfully that he had a way with a horse, a dog and a farmer. He was not a thief. He returned the horse to its owner John Byro after about six weeks.

Q2. Compare and contrast the characters of Mourad and Aram.

**Ans.** Mourad and Aram were cousins thirteen and nine years old respectively. Both longed for a horse ride. But their family was too poor to buy a horse. Both were adventure-loving. Both knew that their family was well known for honesty and right conduct. But Mourad could not help stealing John Byro's horse. While he had a streak of craziness, Aram was honest and

simple-hearted. Mourad was more talented and bolder than Aram. He domesticated the wild horse of John Byro. He repaired the injured wing of a robin bird; he knew how to deal with a horse, a dog and a farmer. Comparatively, Aram was timid and low-lying.
